Building A Lasting Safety Culture

How do you indoctrinate a Safety Culture?

In their initial training, drivers will have gone through over 30 hours of training on many subjects, in a short period of time. There is a limit as to how much a driver can understand, absorb, remember and put into practice. Consequently, to indoctrinate the desired behaviors, we have created a series to continually remind the drivers of the desired behaviors.

To indoctrinate a safety culture, we need to persuade the drivers to continually follow the 22 safe practices on the Safety Management System poster.

Subjects covered are:

- Safety Management System
- Preventing Accidents
- What's In It For Me?
- What Is Safety?
- Preventing Intersection Accidents
- Pedestrian & Bicycle Safety

These short training programs are between 6 and 8 minutes. They focus on reinforcing important safety practices.



The Safety Reminder series programs can be presented to drivers in either of two ways;

1. The drivers can be provided a link to watch on their smartphone, laptop, or computer.
2. They can be presented in a safety meeting then shown again, but stopping after each section to discuss the explained safe practices.

Safety is never achieved. It is a continuous process that requires ongoing persistent attention. By presenting these safety reminders on a regular basis, you keep the desired safe practices at the forefront of your operations and are far more likely to indoctrinate the desired behaviors.

Who Teaches The Students School Bus Safety?

A great question and we fear that in many cases, no one does! Often, the only direction they receive is from the driver at the start of the year.

How important is it that the students are taught the safest behaviors in and around a school bus?

It is of critical importance. After studying past accidents involving students, in almost every accident, had the student acted safely, they would not have been injured or killed.

Often the bus driver or the transportation department do not have the opportunity to present the safe practices to the students in a formal setting. So, it falls to either a teacher or the parent to explain the safest practices.

The School Bus Safety Company has created six programs to teach students about school bus safety, bullying prevention and emergency evacuations. These programs are provided in age appropriate ranges, as follows:



The best method would be for the school district to send an e-mail to all the parents providing a unique web link to the programs. The district would recommend that the parents take their children through the appropriate programs from the nine available. They could ask this be done three times, during each school year.

Alternately, a teacher could present these programs to the students.

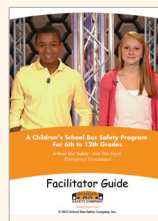

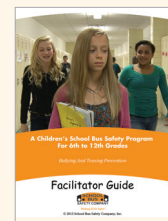

So, What Do These Programs Teach The Students?

The Safety Programs teach the following:

- Never go close to the front of the bus
- Never run after a bus. Always be on time
- How to cross safely in the morning, waiting for driver's directions
- How to cross safely in the afternoon, stopping at the edge of the bumper
- Never pick up anything you drop, near to or under the bus. Tell the driver
- Stay out of the Danger Zones, always at least 10' from the bus
- Never play, push or fight near a school bus
- Remove draw cords from clothing or backpacks

Most student accidents happen while crossing the street. These student programs teach the safest crossing practices. It is very important that students never run across the street. After the driver has signaled them to cross, they should stop at the edge of the bumper.



Correct Crossing Procedure

1. Stop at edge of the bumper.
2. Look left, right then left again.
3. Then look at the driver, for the driver to signal to complete the crossing.
4. Complete the crossing, walk, do not run.

Only when we teach the students to follow safe practices, will we prevent all student danger zone accidents.
